#### OUR VALUE THIS HALF TERM IS RESPECT

This term our value is respect. We began by looking at what it means to give and get respect and how we have to give respect in order to get respect. Then we talked about the rules we have in school and how these relate to the Ten Commandments in the Bible.

We thought about the meaning of respect, which means that you care enough to think about others' feelings before you act. We also talked about the different ways you can show respect, including by being kind, being helpful and being polite.

We thought about different Bible stories that demonstrtate our value of respect, including the Creation Story in Genesis, the story of Elijah helping the widow and the Bible story about Mathew, the tax collector (from Matthew 9.9–12).

#### ODD SOCKS DAY AND ANTI-BULLYING WEEK

On Monday 13th November it was Odd Socks Day. This marks the beginning of Anti-Bullying Week. It is a day when schools, workplaces, and individuals join together to show that it's okay to be different and to stand up against bullying and discrimination. Well done to everyone that wore their odd socks to school to mark the beginning of such an important week! We also had a special Anti-bullying collective worship on Monday, during which Ms Bettoni shared the theme of this year's Anti-bullying week: Make a Noise About Bullying. She encouraged the children to think about what 'banter' is - 'The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks' - and explained that it's not banter if...

- You would be upset if someone said it to you
- It's hurtful
- You're not friends
- Someone's asked you to stop
- The target isn't laughing

• It focuses on someone's insecurities Finally, she shared the Anti-bullying mantra that we want all of our school community to learn and remember: 'We are proud, we are brave. We use our voice to make a change.' You should have received information about our anti-bullying home learning project that we would like all children to take part in to help us to celebrate Anti-Bullying week and all of the wonderful learning that comes with it. This year's theme is 'Make a Noise About Bullying' and there are many ways your child can choose to present their Anti-Bullying project: writing a poem, making a short video, designing a poster, creating a PowerPoint presentation, designing an Anti-Bullying bracelet that could fit onto a rubber wrist band or creating an Anti-Bullying character who spreads kind words. The home learning project is due on Wednesday 22nd November so that we can share projects in special assembly on Thursday.



## **SCERTS**®

towards behaviour, called SCERTS. SCERTS® is a comprehensive intervention model for children to help them develop social communication and emotional regulation skills.

SCERTS provides specific guidelines for helping pupils to become competent and confident social communicators and active learners. By following this model, we hope that it enables pupils to be the most available they can be for their learning, and to prevent problem behaviours. SCERTS is designed to help families, educators and therapists collaborate in a carefully coordinated manner.

A unique aspect of SCERTS is that the most significant challenges are addressed while identifying and building upon strengths. This is accomplished though family professional partnerships, and by prioritising the abilities and supports that will lead to the most positive long-term outcomes. This ties in well with our Trauma Informed Schools Approach (TIS). In practice, we look at how different situations and activities require different levels of energy. Children are guided to understand what different energy levels can look like in their own minds, bodies and behaviours. We then work with children to help them 'power up or power down' where necessary. A change in energy levels will often require different strategies and that is what we aim to teach our pupils.

Each class has 'Energy Check' posters and table aids. Our staff refer to energy levels when speaking with children or working through issues.
